Ply String Snowball Snowman

Supplies that you will need:

- *White string, yarn, or thread
- *Craft Glue
- *Scissors
- *Black buttons for eyes
- *Felt
- *Other items to complete snowman (scarf, hat)

- 1. Blow up different size balloons (one for the head, one for the torso, and one for the bottom)
- 2. Pour glue into a bowl, put yarn in glue, and wrap all balloons with glue-ified thread.
- 3. Leave to dry for a day.
- 4. Pop balloons with needle to reveal your perfect thread balls.
- 5. Assemble and glue parts together.
- 6. Now you have a snowman template—blank canvas.
- 7. Given him a smiling face and decorate him as you want.

Christmas Countdown

Materials:

Red Charger plate Black acrylic paint Black chalk paint Sand paper Decorative ribbon White paint marker Chalk

Directions:

- 1. Sand the inner circle of the charger to remove the glossy texture.
- 2. Paint a layer of black acrylic paint on the inner circle of the charger.
- 3. Once the acrylic paint has dried paint over it with the black chalk paint.
- 4. Once the chalk paint has dried write "Days til Christmas" on the plate leaving enough room for the countdown number above it.
- 5. Hot glue a decorative bow at the center top of the charger.



Tea Light Snowman Ornaments

Here's what you'll need:
Battery operated tea lights
A Black Sharpie
Red Ribbon
Red Pipe Cleaners
Red Pom Poms
Black Felt
Orange Sharpie
Glue Gun



- 1. You'll want to position the face, so that the flame is pointing up.
- 2. Use the black Sharpie to draw a simple face onto the tea light. You can use googly eyes if you want.
- 3. Cut a piece of red pipe cleaner to approximately 2.5" long.
- 4. Curve it around the tea light and then add a small line of hot glue on both ends to hold it in place.
- 5. Add a generous dab of hot glue where the ears would be and add the pom poms. Now your snowman has ear muffs!
- 6. Cut out a piece of ribbon to be approximately 4.5" long. Then cross it over itself and add a small dab of hot glue to hold it together. The best way is to make the ribbon look like a scarf.
- 7. Add a small line of glue to the back of the "scarf."
- 8. And then glue it to the back of the tea light.
- 9. Cut a piece of the thinner red ribbon to be approximately 11" long and then slide it under the pipe cleaner.
- 10. Then tie a tiny knot in the ribbon to keep it together.
- 11. Use a orange sharpie to color the nose/light orange.
- 12. Hat Option: cut a strip of black felt to be approximately 1-1/4" wide. Glue the hat together with some hot glue.
- 13. Since there's no pipe cleaner to hold it in place on this one, you'll need to glue the ribbon right to the tea light. Add a generous dab of hot glue to the tea light, add the ribbon, and then add another generous dab of hot glue, and it should keep it all in place.

Handprint Christmas Tree Napkins

Supplies:

- * Cloth Napkins
- * Fabric Paint (we used green, yellow, brown and red
- * Paint Brushes
- * Baby Wipes
- * Paper Plate
- * Trash Bags/Newspapers
- * Cute Little Hands



Directions:

- * First lay your napkins flat on some clean trash bags or newspapers. This is especially important because the fabric paint will more than likely bleed through to the other side and you don't want your pretty table to get messed up.
- *The next step is to decide where and how many handprint trees you want on the napkins. You can do several {just be sure to map it out first hand} or do a single *Handprint Christmas**Tree like we did.
- * Now grab your green paint and completely cover one of your child's hands with paint. Press it on the napkin to make the start of your tree shape.
- * Now grab your grab your remaining fabric paints and paint on the other tree embellishments {think stem, ornaments, star etc.}
- * Once done, let the paint dry completely before using, storing or gifting away your napkins!

{I highly recommend handwashing these so they are good to go for years to come!}

Cupcake Ornament



Materials Needed:

- glass/plastic bulbs
- acrylic paint in the same/opposite color
- glitter or sprinkles
- foam/paint brush
- red pompoms
- cupcake liners
 - Glob a bunch of paint on the top and try to make it look like frosting as much as possible.
 Make it thick so that it has some dimension.
 - 2. While it was wet, add the glitter or sprinkles.
 - 3. Using the hot glue gun, glue the cupcake liner to the bulb.
 - 4. Add the "cherry" pompom to the top.



christmas pretzel buttons

Ingredients

Small Pretzels Hershey's Kisses (unwrapped) m&m candies

Directions

Preheat the oven to 200°F.

Lay out pretzels on a parchment-lined baking sheet, salty side down if you're extra picky like my husband, and top each one with a Hershey's Kiss.

Bake for about 10 minutes, until the hershey's kisses are just shiny (watch the first batch fairly cloesely and time the rest by that!).

Remove the tray from the oven and immediately press an m&m candy into the top of each kiss.

Let cool completely. (If you don't eat them all immediately, that is!)

Wine Cork Trivet by Brayden Youree

Purchase a hose clamp from the auto store.

Put about 30 to 40 corks together in the clamp and tighten it.

If you chose you can put e6000 glue and place your favorite ribbon and other details you wish.

Merry Christmas Horseshoe

5. Hot glue Merry Christmas to horseshoe

6. Glue small amount of greenery to bottom of horseshoe

7. Glue concho on top greenery stem



Christmas Calming Bottles

Supplies

- Container: Water or Soda Bottle (16-20 oz), glass Mason jar, or any kind of bottle or jar you find. Plastic is really better if giving it to a child.
- One bottle of clear glue (not white glue that dries clear), or glitter glue: I use the clear glue. Glue/glitter glue works best, but you could also use corn syrup if that's all you have (You have to pour corn syrup directly in the water without letting it touch the sides of the bottle or the glitter will stick to it).
- Water: It can be room temperature or warm if you use regular glue but should be hot if glitter glue is used. If the water is not hot enough then the glitter glue will become clumpy and separate.
- Glitter: You can add sequins, beads, shells, plastic jewels, etc. Glow in the dark glitter looks really cool if you can find it. Less (or even none) is needed if glitter glue was used.
- Food coloring: This is optional. Only use one drop or it becomes difficult to see the glitter.
- Strong glue or duct tape: This is used to fasten the lid to the container.

Directions

- Making a Calm Bottle (clear glue): Fill the bottle ¾ of the way full with warm water. Then add the glue (I use ½ bottle of 9 oz Elmer's clear glue) shake to mix it up, add glitter (I use a funnel for the glitter) and shake. If is settles to fast add more glue, if it settles to slow add more water.
- Add 1 drop of food coloring, if desired. The glitter adds color to the water.
- Glue or /tape the lid on.
- Making a Calm Bottle (glitter glue): Instead of clear glue you can use glitter glue. If you go this route then mix the glitter glue in a bowl with very hot water (boil the water) before adding it to the bottle. If the water is not hot enough then the glue will clump up and not work. You can add 1 drop of food color and additional glitter is desired.

Snowman Mason Jar Gift

Materials:

Mason Jar

Bakers Twine

3 Black Buttons

White Chocolate Covered Pretzels

Red Fleece

Instructions:



- 1. Use hot glue to glue 3 black buttons to the front of the jar.
- 2. Tie a scrap of red fleece around the neck for a scarf.
- 3.Fill the jar with white chocolate covered pretzels.
- 4. Add the lid and a decorative tag with the bakers twine.

YARN SNOWMAN

Materials Needed

1 Skein of Yarn – White or sparkle Scissors Small twigs Straw Glue – school glue or Hot Glue

- 1. Wrap yarn around 3 finger 170 times. Slide off and use yarn to tie the center of loops. Cut all loops and trim to form nice yarn puff.
- 2. Repeat step one using 2 fingers and 150 times around.
- 3. Repeat again using your thumb and 100 times around.
- 4. Slide straw thru center of each puff and trim to correct length. And glue top and bottom to secure puffs on straw.
- 5. Trim and glue twigs on for arms, nose, and eyes.
- 6. Add any embellishments such as hat, buttons, or scarf.

Spiced Pecans

- 1 Egg White
- 1 Tablespoon Water
- 1 Cup Sugar
- ¾ Teaspoon Salt
- ½ Teaspoon Cinnamon
 - In a bowl, mix the sugar, salt, and cinnamon.
 - In a separate bowl, whip the egg white and water until frothy.
 - Stir in the Pecan Halves until coated well.
 - Pour the sugar mixture over the pecans and stir until coated well.
 - Spread on a well greased cookie sheet.
 - Bake at 250 Degrees for 1 hour, stirring every 15 minutes.
 - Let cool on cookie sheet.

- Let it dry over night, then remove the tape.


These make great candle holders as well as jars to package gifts in or just to use as decoration.



Lighted Burlap Garland

Here's What You Need:

- •2 inch red burlap ribbon
- •2 inch green burlap ribbon
- •2.5 inch natural burlap ribbon
- White mini lights
- Scissors



Here's How You Make It:

- 1. Cut the burlap into 8-10 inch pieces.
- 2. Then cut those pieces vertically, down the middle. Otherwise, the ribbon is too wide and looks wonky when tied in a knot on the lights.
- 3. Choose a pattern in the order you want the colors to show. Start tying those burlap strips around the wire. Tie once.
- 4. Repeat. Over. And. Over.

Christmas Candle Holders

What you will need:

- Wine glasses or jars (they can be used if they are clean.)
- Paint and brushes (regular craft paint works great)
- Tape (for making lines to separate the colors of paint on the glass)
- Decorations if you want (like ribbon, stick on eyes, stickers, yarn, etc.)
- Hot glue gun (for attaching decorations)

First:

Take your glass and tape and mark where you want your colors to separate. Like if you want your face a different color than the hat.

Next:

Paint the area with your desired color. I find if you let it dry then put a second coat it covers better. Once you have reached your desired coating and the paint dries, remove the tape and finish painting. Again, a second coat maybe needed.

Then:

After all base paint is dry, you can go back and decorate with painted faces, eyes, ribbon, etc.

Finally:

Once all the paint and glue is dry, you my place your candle in or on top of the finished project and enjoy its beauty.

Rice Krispies Holiday Wreaths



Ingredients

3 tablespoons butter or margarine

L package (10 oz., about 40) JET-PUFFED Marshmallows

4 cups JET-PUFFED Miniature Marshmallows

I teaspoon green food coloring

6 cups Kellogg's® Rice Krispies® cereal

Assorted candies

Canned frosting or decorating gel

OR

Directions

- In large saucepan melt butter over low heat. Add marshmallows and stir until completely melted.
 Remove from heat. Stir in food coloring.
- Add KELLOGG'S RICE KRISPIES cereal. Stir until well coated.
- Using 1/4-cup measuring cup coated with cooking spray portion cereal mixture. Using buttered hands each portion into small wreath. Decorate with frosting and/or candies. Best if served the same day.

MICROWAVE DIRECTIONS:

In microwave-safe bowl heat butter and marshmallows on HIGH for 3 minutes, stirring after 2 minutes. Stir until smooth. Follow steps 2 and 3 above. Microwave cooking times may vary.

Note

For best results, use fresh marshmallows. 1 jar (7 oz.) marshmallow crème can be substituted for marshmallows.

Diet, reduced calorie or tub margarine is not recommended.

Store no more than two days at room temperature in airtight container. To freeze, place in layers separated by wax paper in airtight container. Freeze for up to 6 weeks. Let stand at room temperature for 15 minutes before serving.

Directions - Wrap the toilet paper roll with tissue paper using appropriate colors either for a snowman or grinch. Tape the long ends and tuck the excess paper into the ends of the roll. Once they are all wrapped glue on your parts. If making the Grinch glue on eyes and using a black sharpie draw on your eyes.

Let's Turn Clothespins Into Snowflake Christmas Tree Ornaments...

Presented by:

Mason & Shawn Leifeste, Cameron 4-H

In just a few steps, turn wooden clothespins into beautiful snowflake tree ornaments. This is a great project for older children to tackle on their own or for small kids with help from a crafty adult.

Materials Needed:

- 8 wooden clothespins per snowflake
- ribbon
- embellishments of your choice (buttons, beads, burlap, twine, smaller snowflakes, etc.)
- hot glue gun and glue sticks
- spray paint or craft paint or stain and a paintbrush
- craft paper or drop cloth
- scissors

Step 1) Separate Clothespins


Twist the clothespin sideways and wiggle it loose from the metal spring and disregard the spring. Now you should have two wooden pieces. (See image 1)

Step 2) Paint

Working in a well-ventilated room or outside, cover a tabletop with craft paper or a drop cloth. Then paint or stain the clothespins. For small kids, craft paint applied with a paint brush is a great alternative. Allow to dry. (See image 2)

Step 3) Glue Clothespins' Backs Together

Add hot glue to the clothespins' unpainted backs. While glue is still hot, press top and bottom clothespin pieces together to create one spoke of the snowflake. Repeat these steps for six of the remaining spokes, leaving one pair of clothespin halves unglued. (See image 3)



Step 4) Connect First Layer of Spokes

Now connect spokes four at a time since the glue will dry faster with less weight to adhere to. Using a hot glue gun, add a bead of glue along each angled tip. Once four spokes are connected, lay them flat on craft paper or drop cloth to dry thoroughly. (See *image 4*)

Step 5) Connect Second Layer of Spokes

Connect three of the four remaining spokes by adding a bead of glue to the angled tips, then placing it between each existing, pre-glued spoke.

Note: The final spoke will be outfitted as the ornament's hanger and requires extra steps. (See image 5)



Cut a two-to three-inch section of ribbon from the spool. Add a bead of hot glue along the unpainted back of each of the two remaining clothespin pieces. Before joining them together, insert ribbon loop to create a hanger and press both pieces together until glue has cooled. (See image 6)



Step 7) Add Hanging Spoke

Finally, add a bead of hot glue to the angled tip of the hanging spoke. Place it in position and hold in place for a few seconds until glue has dried. Now you have a fully assembled snowflake. (See *image* 7)

Step 8) Add Embellishments

Now if you want to dress it up a little bit, you can add anything you like to the middle of your snowflake. We used embellishments like smaller snowflakes, ribbon, burlap, twine...the options are endless.

Rice Microwave Heat Packs:

Heating Pack:

Things you will need: fabric and thread sewing machine long-grain rice lavender essential oil



Mix rice and a few drops of lavender essential oil and set to the side. Cut fabric to the size of the pack you want. Turn your fabric inside out. Sew around three edges. Leave one open to fill with rice. Pull the fabric to turn it back to the right side showing. Fill the packet with rice. Sew the open side closed. Heat in the microwave to warm. ENJOY! Great for sore muscles!

Hand Warmers:

Things you will need: fabric and thread sewing machine long-grain rice

Cut fabric to the size of the circle pack you want. Turn your fabric inside out. Sew around the edges. Leave one part open (about 1 inch) to fill with rice. Pull the fabric to turn it back to the right side showing. Fill the packet with rice. Sew the open side closed. Heat in the



microwave to warm. ENJOY! Great for those cold hunting trips!

These Reindeer Ornaments require the following supplies:

- Wide-mouth mason jar lids
- Brown Spray Paint
- Googly eyes
- Red pom-poms
- Clothespins
- Baker's Twine (or other similar string or ribbon)
- A hot glue gun, super glue, or craft glue
 - 1. Have an adult help you spray paint the mason jar lids brown in a protected area.
 - 2. When lids are dry clip clothespins on and glue nose, eyes.
 - 3. Lastly, add twine to back to hang from the tree.

Optional: You can spray the antlers with glitter to add a snow-like effect to them if you'd like.

Materials:

Clear glass salt shaker with lid Small bottle brush tree or other mini Christmas decoration of your choice Epsom salt Glitter

Tape or material to seal the top of base of shaker Ribbon Material to cover lid Craft beads

Directions:

- 1. Glue tree to the bottom inside of the salt shaker
- 2. Mix glitter with Epsom salt and add to the salt shaker (enough to cover base of tree)
- 3. Put tape over the top of the base of the shaker to prevent salt from spilling
- 4. Cover salt shaker lid with material (optional)
- 5. Thread ribbon through the salt shaker holes and knot. Add embellishment to top of ribbon. (Optional)
- 6. Hang on your Christmas tree and enjoy!

3 - ½ inch plywood strips 8" wide and 40" long or any scraps of wood you have handy

2- 1x2 wood pieces

Wood stain of your choice

J and Y letter stencils

White paint

- 1. Nail 1x2's to the back of wood strips
- 2. Stain wood if desired and allow to dry
- Using J and Y stencils, trace each letter onto the wood. (J to the far left, and Y to the far right)
- 4. Paint J and Y with white paint.
- 5. Hang wreath between J and Y with nail or use staple gun
- 6. Place a picture hanger on back of sign if desired

Root Beer Reindeer

Long neck Root Beer Bottles in carton or individually

Instructions:

- 1 Wrap pipe cleaner around the neck of bottle and twist.

Materials:

Old Picture Frame

High Gloss Outdoor Spray Paint (choose colors)

Christmas Ribbon (choose colors)

Christmas Ornaments (choose colors)

Glitter (choose colors)

Directions:

- 1. Find an old frame at a garage sale and paint it bright red. This will function as the wreath frame. While the idea features a square frame, you can use a circle or oval shaped frame.
- 2. Paint glue onto bottom half of ornaments and dip in glitter. Let dry.
- 3. Paint glue on monogram letter and dip in glitter. Let dry.
- 4. In the middle of the frame, display a bow and hang ornaments down the middle of the frame with bright ribbons.
- 5. Add your monogram to complete the look.
- 6. Hang on your front door!

- 1. Get 4 mason jars or as many to spell what you wish.
- 2. Chalk paint (colors of your choice) the jars
- 3. Stencil letters or whatever you wish on the jars. (We used NOEL and FALL)
- 4. Use e6000 glue to place ribbon or other decoration around the top of the jars.
- 5. Fill jars with candy or flowers of your choice.

Pine Cone Christmas Trees

- Items:
- Clean pine cones
- Craft paint
- Brush
- Craft glue
- Glitter
- Small terracotta pots
- Aluminum stars

Instructions:

- Carefully wash the pine cones in soapy water. (The pine cones closed when washing them, but after drying on newspapers for about a day they opened again.)
- Paint the pots.
- Paint the tip of each scale on the pine cones.
- When the paint is dry, put a thin line of glue on the edge of the scales near the top of my mini tree and sprinkle glitter on the glue to make it look like the mini trees have been dusted by frost.
- When the glue dried, set a pine cone in each painted pot and top each pine cone with a star made out of a craft foil.

Materials- 50 yards of white tulle on spool cut to 15 inch pieces, 12' wreath form, 1 adult sized Santa hat, hot glue gun

Directions- Put hat on wreath and mark where each side ends on wreath. Tie tulle stripes around the wreath from one mark to the other. A simple knot is best. Using a glue gun secure the hat onto the wreath. Stitch a piece of scrap ribbon to the back of the hat to hang wreath.


You can also make them a bit more 'fancy' by adding a ribbon to the tag, like these below.
